## DON'T RISK LOSING THE USE OF YOUR MACHINES

Clubs are being warned that they must register their fruit machines with the tax authorities by the end of this month or risk not being able to use them.

Machine Games Duty (MGD) replaces Amusement Machine Licence Duty on 1st February 2013. Clubs with gaming or skill machines liable to MGD must register with the tax authorities by December 31.

An explanatory Registration Notice from Her Majesty's Revenue & Customs (HMRC) has been distributed to all Union clubs from Head Office. By law a club operating liable machines at 31st December 2012 and continuing to do so at 1st February 2013 must apply for registration by 31st December 2012.

Refer to the Registration Notice to see how to register online or by post on form MGD1. The online system is preferable and provides greater certainty. Do not delay, register now and avoid the risk.

Beryl (pictured) took up watercolour painting from scratch in 2005 six months after a tour guide in India told her she should be an artist. She now teaches a weekly class at the club and hopes to put some of her paintings on display this month.

## 75 years of the builders' hut

A club started in a builders' hut celebrates its 75th anniversary this month with a party weekend for its 2,000 members. Cheam Social Club in Surrey will stage three days of entertainment from December 21, including a children's Christmas party and a performance on the piano from its longest serving member. The club premises began life in the 1920s as a builders' hut on what is now the Park Farm estate. When the estate was finished the hut, which by now had become a substantial building, was leased to the people of Cheam as a social club and it's never looked back.

#### **GUEST ALES**

In 1993 the members purchased the freehold of the building. They also own a three-bedroom house next door to the club which is used as a residence for the Steward.

The Committee upgraded the facilities in 1988 to include a games room, large dance hall and a kitchen. In 2007 a second facelift with the help of brewers Carlsberg UK created a new 21st century club (left) with leather chairs, small round tables, pastel colours and a dining area for 45 people. As well as inexpensive beers and spirits members choose a guest real ale each month.

The membership now stands at 2,264 of which 381 are life members including the club's longest serving member Ray Mansell. Ray, who has been a member since 1948, still comes in every evening for a couple of pints, and will be playing the piano for members on December 23.

### Members' ideas turn club around

A club in Harrogate has been named as the most-improved club in the country – after its Committee asked the members what would make them come to the club more often.

Bilton WMC won the most improved section at the recent Club Awards in Manchester and Entertainment Secretary Mike Dinsdale received the award from sports presenter Chris Hollins.

"This has taken a lot of hard work," said Club Secretary John Wrightson. "But we are very proud to have turned the club round." The club was struggling and in danger of closing when the Committee decided action was required. Members were given a questionnaire and asked what would make them visit the club more often - something suggested in a recent issue of Club Journal. "We got a few ideas from that," said John "But what really made a difference was when I called an extraordinary general meeting. I think people thought we were about to close because 400 people attended the meeting.

"I told them we would end up closing unless we either put a pound on a pint or everybody made an effort and visited the club just once a week."

The club now runs a selection of community-based activities including judo and self-defence courses, dance classes (in salsa and bachatango (a combination of the Argentinian tango and the bachata from the Domininican Republic) and children's discos. It was also due to host the Harrogate Tweet Up late last month where Twitter users have the chance to meet their followers.

The result is that a £5,000 loss has been turned into a £17,000 surplus and the Committee now plan to host live music events featuring both local bands and established acts as well as a Foster's comedy evening.

The club (pictured above) has also been helped by its location next to a busy set of traffic lights on Skipton Road, one of the town's busiest roads, and has erected a large movable sign board, which is regularly updated with news of upcoming events.

## **LESS CAN BE MORE**

## Part-timers and **Bank Holidays**

Many clubs have managed to show that less can be more by cutting back on entertainment but improving its quality.

It can be a risky strategy but committees need to question whether their regular entertainment brings members through the doors. Several clubs have decided to reduce their regular entertainment from once or twice a week to once a month but with the much better high quality entertainment for which members seem to clamour.

Rather than organising an evening when only a few people are present and the club lose money on the entertainment, why not take the members into your confidence, tell them what you plan to do and see how the reaction would be? A higher class of entertainment, perhaps once a month, would ensure a full concert room and also result in a saving for the club.

Some clubs also find if they charge for the entertainment to help pay for its costs members appreciate the better quality and take more interest in the act. Instead of talking all the way through - which doesn't help the atmosphere – they are more likely to enjoy the whole evening.

Club Journal has highlighted two recent examples of clubs which have taken this approach. Briton Ferry WMC book the occasional well-known act and charge as much as £8 for people to see them. The Poplar Club at Accrington take a different the Regulations, or a claim of indirect tack with less well-known turns. The act can play for free, or for a nominal amount but keep the door money, and the club keep the bar takings.

How much holiday, including Bank Holidays, are part-time workers entitled

Part-time workers have the basic right not to be treated less favourably than a comparable full-time worker. This means that a part-time worker is entitled to the same paid holidays, on a pro rata basis, as a full-time worker.

Bank Holidays are not additional to the statutory paid leave under the Working Time Regulations. There is no statutory right to Bank holidays.

There are basically four possible approaches to resolving this:

- Let the part-time workers take all eight Bank Holidays regardless of the days of the week they work. If they don't work on days that the Bank Holidays fall, they get given credit, often in the same week, so a "Tuesday-to-Friday" four-day-worker would have the Tuesday of a Bank Holiday week off instead of the Monday. This may provoke complaints from full-time staff.
- Don't give them any at all. There is no statutory right to Bank Holidays. However, as well as being inherently unfair there would be a very high risk of a claim under sex discrimination on the basis that the requirement to work full-time is a condition which is more difficult for the majority of women to comply with than men if they are

given to full-time workers.

- Provide paid leave on Bank Holidays when the holiday falls on their normal working day, but not if it does not. This is a big advantage for those who work on Mondays and a disadvantage for those who do not.
- · Pro rata the Bank Holiday leave across the year. For example, a part-time worker who works three out of five days should therefore be entitled to receive three fifths of the Bank Holiday entitlement - 4.8 days, which would normally be rounded up to five. This is the approach previously recommended by the Department for Business, Enterprise and Regulatory Reform. The Government now believes that the increases in holiday entitlement will make it easier for employers to calculate time off for Bank Holidays for part-time

This article deals only with part-time workers who receive the basic statutory holiday entitlement under the Working Time Regulations.

• Bank Holidays are historically a rather strange concept as they can be specified by Royal proclamation as well as legislation in the usual way. This year, for instance there was an extra Bank Holiday for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee.

Officially a Bank Holiday is a day when banks are entitled to close. The terms Bank Holiday and public holiday are often used interchangeably but Christmas Day and Good Friday are public holidays, not Bank Holidays. This is because they had been holidays for so long under common law that they weren't included when the original Bank Holiday Act was drawn up in 1871.

## Follow up our beer victory with MPs

Club and pub-goers everywhere have secured a major victory in recent weeks: an online petition calling on the Government to scrap the beer duty escalator has collected more than 104,000 signatures.

The beer duty escalator is used by the Government to increase the tax on beer by 2% above inflation every single year. It is forcing clubs and pubs to increase their prices and so people are choosing to buy cut-price alcohol from the supermarket to drink at home instead. Since it was introduced in 2008, over 5,800 pubs have rung last orders and shut their doors for ever. CAMRA's latest figures show that now weekly pub closures are up from 12 a week to 18 a week.

After the petition hit the magical 100,000 signatures, MPs debated this vital issue in Parliament on 1st November. Not a single MP spoke out in support of the escalator in the debate and the motion for a review of the social and economic impact of the escalator was passed unanimously by MPs. The impact on clubs was a key concern from MPs and were mentioned no fewer than 20 times

A full review of the excise duty system is long overdue and the timing is critical to get the Government to act in time for the 2013 Budget. We're not asking for much; not for an end to war or for action to stop climate change – just for beer duty not to increase by more than inflation.



Now it's time to keep the pressure on and make sure MPs and the



Government follow through with real action to support our pubs and clubs. The Save Your Pint Campaign and CAMRA have organised a mass lobby of Parliament on Wednesday 12th December. We call upon everyone involved in clubs, not just Committees, but ordinary members and bar staff to come and join us on the day and make their voices heard by lobbying their local MP.

If you want to come along and tell your MP what you think about the escalator go to www.saveyourpintlobby.org.uk to register. As well as meeting your MP there'll be a chance to link up with others in your area including CAMRA members and publicans. There will be a rally with speakers after the lobby and of course you'll be able to enjoy a well-earned pint on us.

## Use positive discrimination

Dear Editor,

During the beer escalator debate, the Treasury Minister Sajid Javid said the industry was on the decline for many other reasons anyway. In effect he was saying the Government were happy to help it on its way by putting the boot in as well — but surely it is the task of Government to preserve industry.

The debate revealed that a 60% hike in duty has led to only a 10% rise in revenue. The truth is that they could increase revenue by acknowledging that our clubs and pubs are not the same as supermarkets and discriminating in their favour. A further truth is that the more people that can

be encouraged to drink in safe, regulated and comfortable surroundings the fewer will be liable to binge drink and be subject to mental and physical illness through isolation.

At our AGM in Blackpool motions were passed by huge majorities stating what is required to help our clubs survive and, hopefully, be revived. If adopted jobs will be preserved; the club and pub industry will be preserved; the entertainment industry will be preserved; and the evils of overindulgence will be more effectively tackled. The last Government ignored the recommendations of the Select Committee's review of the Licensing Act. This Government seems to be ignoring the totally valid arguments about the escalator. I suggest to the Prime Minister that he creates a new ministry entitled "The Ministry of Common Sense" to have an input into the work of all ministries? It may sound flippant but it is deadly serious.

## Dransfields

Dransfields, the Union's recommended supplier of gaming and amusement machines to clubs, has launched an improved website that includes a guide to the new Machine Games Duty.

Every club received a copy of the Dransfields guide to the new tax with last month's issue of Club Journal as well as a copy of the Registration Notice from the Revenue & Customs. It is imperative that clubs register with HMRC by December 31 or they will be seriously out of pocket as they will not be able to use their machines.

Managing Director Chris Haley told us: "Our calculations indicate that the majority of clubs will be better off under the new system but it's vital that they register by the end of the month. With Christmas upon us this can easily be forgotten about so clubs should register as soon as possible."

Dransfields website (www.Dransfields.com) also includes details of how to register along with a form that customers of Dransfields can send back to the firm as machine suppliers have a legal obligation to check registration details.

#### One armed bandit

The revamped website explains how being 100% family-owned and 100% customer-focused has helped make Dransfields the largest independent UK supplier of gaming and amusement machines to clubs and the licensed trade for over 65 years.

Dransfield Novelty Company Limited was founded by Harry Dransfield, grandfather of the current chairman Robert Dransfield, back in the 1940s. After coming into possession of a "one-armed bandit", the original lever-operated fruit machine, he quickly spotted its potential and acquired more machines to supply to the licensed trade around Leeds and Newcastle, becoming a licensed gaming machine supplier when the 1968 Gaming Act was introduced. When Harry's son Jack joined the business it steadily



expanded to become one of the largest machine suppliers in the North of England.

"When the current Managing Director Chris Haley joined the company in 1996, Dransfields set out on a modernisation and expansion programme with the aim of becoming the number one national supplier of gaming machines to clubs," says Robert Dransfield.

"We now have experienced teams of service engineers operating from local depots strategically located across the UK on call 7 days a week, 364 days a year, providing a rapid response service; the priority we place on service clearly marks us out from our competitors and minimises costly machine downtime."

The nudge feature, which is still an integral part of most modern gaming machines was developed and patented by Dransfields and demonstrates their long-established pedigree within the industry.

Trevor Carter, the son of Harry Dransfield's engineering partner Albert Carter, was watching an early machine being played; the reels displayed two jackpot bars with the third jackpot bar just above the winning position on the third reel and the player said: "If only we had some way of moving the third bar down onto the winline."

This was the spark that led to the development of the "nudge" and was incorporated in the very popular "Club Nudger".

At that time, the feature would allow only one nudge on one reel to advance downwards to enhance the chances of a winning combination. Later, game enhancement was increased dramatically by allowing multiple nudges on all reels and two machines, "Feature Win" and "Reel Chance", were developed by Jim Trueman of Dransfields using the new multi-nudge technology. The machines were an instant success with time penalties on

nudging greatly increasing the excitement of the machines.

The feature was further enhanced with the advent of electronic technology, allowing reels to be nudged up as well as down. Around 70 machines were developed by Dransfields

between 1973 and 1994 and following this the nudge feature was adopted by most other manufacturers. It still remains one of the most popular features of the modern gaming machine.

Buttershaw Lane is a residential part of Bradford with a good smattering of pubs but they don't provide competition for this club not when they sell beer at £1.35 a pint. It's a bit of a change from 1984 when Graham Dawson took over as Club President with the club owing £80,000. "I vowed to sell the cheapest beer in Bradford and I've achieved that ambition," he says. "I'm a tight Yorkshireman and I don't like like paying more for anything

He's not the only one: Graham recalls that when the club first put a bar into the concert room they charged a penny extra. "That bar never sold anything. People would buy their beer at the bar in the lounge and carry it through to the concert room rather than pay the extra penny." Hard work through the 80s paid off the club's debts meaning they were able to regain their deeds from Bass in 1995 and were then free to strike deals with other breweries. Since then the club have proved themselves skilled negotiators and continue to deal with a range of breweries to keep competition keen. They were able to keep prices the same for nine years and it's no coincidence there is a waiting list of people keen to join the club's 900 members.

"There's no such thing as an interest-free brewery loan because you then have to take their beer," says Graham, who is currently taking a back seat as Assistant Secretary to Secretary Chris Daly. "We don't owe anybody anything so we can negotiate great prices." The club turns over £10,000 a week, which

on a Sunday. It began life in 1916 in three terrace houses, which are now shops, which belonged to a property developer called Brearcliffe, a founder member whose name

lives on at nearby Brearcliffe Drive, and whose son Frank was a prominent member of the Committee. The club then moved across Buttershaw Lane in 1922 to two Nissen huts at its current site. They were built on top of a brick base and gave the club its nickname of the Rubbing Board. In the days before health and safety children were able to play underneath the club and would occasionally find pennies down there.

The Rubbing Board remained in place until 1964 when the current premises were built. At first there was just one bar but in 1974 the club was extended, with new toilets and the new bar added


> in the concert room. Now one bar goes right through.

In 1981 the club added a conservatory next to its front door to create a foyer and its double doors are particularly well suited for those needing disabled access. A bookcase in the fover allows members to operate a book swapping club with £1 donated to the Armed Forces Support Group charity when one is taken out.

The club has also recently presented a cheque for £600 to Help for Heroes and helped out a Trustee's grandson. It's a shining example of how a club can thrive in the current climate with a bit of determination.







Durham club legend Tom Ward has capped his amazing career at the age of 90 by helping his club's third division snooker team win their CIU league knock-out—a giant-killing feat marked by an Olympic-themed presentation.

Tom, who has been Club Secretary at Hunwick WMC for more than 50 years and is credited with saving the club in 1994, has been a billiards and snooker champion even longer. He played in the club's treble-winning billiard team, who were English national champions in 1950 and Branch champions six years running; in the early 70s he was asked to fill in for someone on the snooker team and has kept his place ever since.
